

Jung Typology Test Instructions

- 1. Visit: <u>http://www.humanmetrics.com/cgi-win/JTypes2.asp</u>
- 2. Answer the 72 Yes/No Questions
 - When you answer the questions, simply go with your "gut reaction"; try not to analyze the responses too much.
- 3. When you complete the questions click on "Score It"
 - You will then have a page come up similar to below.




Jung Typology Test Indicator results:

Simply write which letter you had indicated from the test



How strong are you for each type? Write the percentage for each of the types above.

-The higher the percentage the more closely you align with that type. Anything below 25% means you could actually flip between the two types any time, which is very normal throughout a person's life.



1). For a more detailed description of your personality, type your four letter personality into a search engine followed by personality - for example "ISFJ Personality" and choose the "Portrait of an ISFJ – The Personality Page".

- What are some interesting characteristics about your personality type?
- Are there items you agree with? Disagree with?
- Do you agree this is your personality type all of the time? If not, what changes it?


2). After reading about your personality, scroll to the bottom of the page and choose "Careers for ISFJ" (your personality type indicator).



Let's look at your possible career some more.



Basic Questions you need to ask yourself are:

- What career did you choose?
- What are the education requirements for this career? Do you want to go to school that long?
- What is the wage scale for this career?
- Does this job seem to fit your personality and why?
- What is the job outlook? Will there be careers in this field in the future? (scroll further down the page) What does this mean?
- Do the "Things They Need to Be Able to Do" fit with what you are good at? (near the bottom of the page) Does this fit who you are? Why or why not?

Budget Your Future

The solid arrow on the career overview leads to "Create a Budget" – use this as a guide to see if your potential career will fit your life style

• Think of the budget as a high school/college graduate and maybe as an adult who is 30.

What age were you planning this budget for? (i.e. now, college student, out of college)

What county did you plan this wage for? (You can only choose counties in Michigan, so if you plan to live in a city even elsewhere, choose Kent County, which is Grand Rapids for example.)

After choosing your life style choices you will see the following estimates at the end:
